
BOARD PROFILE: BCF PRESIDENT CLAUDE PERASSO



"HARVEY'S GARDEN AT BLACKIE'S PASTURE" CONTINUES TO BLOSSOM


The Belvedere Community Foundation is pleased to continue its support of the Peninsula's largest and most prolific public garden.


With its new "official" name, *Harvey's Garden at Blackie's Pasture*, and the loving attention of twenty-four volunteers coordinated by Master Gardener Harvey Rogers, the 8,000 square-foot raised flower bed near the parking lot at Blackie's Pasture continues to be a welcoming public garden for the many visitors and locals who visit the area every day.

Harvey reported that the unusually severe cold weather of December 2013 caused many plants to die and required a postponement of the normal pruning schedule. But the Cape Plumbago and several Tagetes came back beautifully and are now five feet tall and "blooming their heads off!"

irrigation system batteries, a new solar system for the four controllers was installed and the system is working well. The volunteers removed an area of Manzanita that was over half-dead and replaced them with plants that have a long, colorful blooming period. In October the Gardening Brigade plans to develop another area with similar longer-blooming plants.

Harvey smiles as he volunteers some advice to Peninsula residents, "The garden has never looked as colorful as it does now. Come and see for yourself!."

ALL ABOARD!

The Belvedere/Tiburon Bike Train was launched last fall to encourage Reed School students to bike safely to school. Every Wednesday morning an adult cycling "conductor" and parent volunteers escorted students to school. The bike train started at the San Francisco Yacht Club and followed the Old Rail Trail picking up students along the way, ending at Bel Aire School. Registration was free. Besides the obvious goal of reducing traffic congestion and pollution along Tiburon Boulevard, the Bike Train also:

- · Teaches students how to ride safely
- · Promotes healthy lifestyle habits
- · Creates social interaction with new friends
- · Gives students a sense of confidence and pride
- · Supports the theory that exercise helps students concentrate

On average, ten students rode to school each week. Most rewarding for conductor Kathy McLeod was witnessing the learning and fitness curve of the participants and

seeing more "unofficial" bike trains start up in other neighborhoods. As participants became more confident in their biking abilities and parents more comfortable with their child's safety, many of the kids began to ride more frequently and independently of the Bike Train. This is truly the ultimate goal of the Bike Train – healthy students, less traffic, a true win-win!

FUN RUN FOR SUCCESS



fundraising for their favorite programs, including music, physical education, technology and science programs.




Left: Sam Yolles runs the course around McKegney Green.

OLD ST. HILARY'S BELL RESTORATION

Though the full restoration of Old St. Hilary's by the Belvedere-Tiburon Landmarks Society is still underway, with help from the Belvedere Community Foundation, the restoration of the bell is complete. The wheel was badly warped and twisted and the old rusted bell was unable to swing. Now that the beautiful bronze bell, iron bracket and swing arm have been cleaned of corrosive rust and repaired, the bell is able to swing and ring once more as it did in 1888 when the church was built.


FUN FAIR RAISES FUNDS FOR YOUTH LIBRARY PROGRAMS



The Richardson Bay Audubon Center & Sanctuary conserves 10.5 upland acres and 900 sub-tidal acres along the shoreline of Richardson Bay, an area that provides a feeding and resting spot for thousands of migratory waterbirds during the peak winter migration. This safe haven provides public access with unparalleled viewing opportunities for nature lovers of all ages and the Belvedere Community Foundation is a proud supporter.

The Audubon Center provides interactive educational programs and activities for children and adults. In 2015 the Audubon Center will hold its second Waterbird Festival and plans to increase activities such as docentled beach and birding walks, kayak and/or boating trips on the outskirts of the Sanctuary's waters, speaker sessions on a variety of topics and interactive and handson activities for people of all ages.
