

BCF - REFLECTIONS ON THE LAST THREE DECADES

In the summer of 1990 three distinguished Belvedere

citizens, each a former mayor, met to discuss how to take advantage of the overwhelming success of a recent Belvedere voter-approved capital improvement measure.

Don Davis, Bob Gordon, and Chuck Auerbach had each served the City of Belvedere for many years, and their love of this magnificent place motivated them to stay involved. Inspired by what they saw as the generosity of Belvedere citizens to "tax" themselves in order assure the quality of life in Belvedere, they hatched the concept of a

community foundation. November 17, 1990 marked the first official meeting of the City of Belvedere Foundation Trustees. **Donald Davis, Sandra Donnell, Philip Ehrlich, R.H. Fink, Robert Gordon** and **William Smith** met at the San Francisco Yacht club and each contributed \$200 to open a bank account. The organization's name was changed the following year to Belvedere Community Foundation.

As we look forward to the 30th year of BCF's involvement in our community, we can reflect on the growth and achievements of the last three decades. There are now almost 100 Trustees and Advisory Trustees volunteering their efforts for BCF, and as its endowment has grown, so has BCF's ability to support the physical, social, and cultural needs of Belvedere. This newsletter documents how money contributed by you, the citizens of Belvedere who are willing to "tax" yourselves, is spent for the good of our community. We who serve on the Board are humbled by your trust and are inspired to help support the activities and programs that make our city so special.



BCF SUPPORTS CITY COUNCIL CHAMBER UPGRADES

Attendees at the **BCF** Annual Meeting in November will enjoy the slide show and photo contest on a new state-of-the-art display system, thanks to a grant from BCF that helped the City upgrade its audio-visual capabilities. A new laser projector and HDMI scaler provide a clear, sharp image. The City also upgraded many monitors used by the city council and other legislative bodies during meetings, and new rechargeable microphones replaced the wireless audio equipment.





BELVEDERE BLOCK CAPTAINS UPGRADE COMMUNICATIONS

In the event of an emergency, communication will be crucial for saving lives but land lines and cell towers may be out of commission. With help from BCF, each Block Captain will receive a two-way radio and learn how to use it. An ongoing BCF grant will fund regular battery replacement so that radios are always ready for use.

YELLOW BUS CHALLENGE HELPS EASE TRAFFIC WOES

The pilot program doubled school-bus ridership to 44% of RUSD students and reduced transit times on Tiburon Boulevard by 40% at school drop-off and pick-up times. The Yellow Bus Program, which serves all three Reed District campuses and the Cove School in Corte Madera, is completing its most successful year of operations to date.

EUCALYPTUS LANE RESTORATION REOPENS HISTORIC PATH

A five-year Belvedere Lane Initiative seeks to repair and reopen our public lanes. The first project, now renamed Golden Gate Lane, will connect Golden Gate Avenue with Belvedere Avenue. This path will provide a beautiful view of the Golden Gate Bridge, improve walking on the west side of the island, and provide an emergency evacuation route on that side. Look for it to be completed this fall.


CAMP CREATE TEACHES KIDS TO PLANT, SOW, GROW
