







MARIN VILLAGES VOLUNTEER NETWORK ALLOWS PENINSULA SENIORS TO AGE IN PLACE








BCF HELPS SPREAD THE WORD ABOUT "GET READY TO GO 94920"



AUDUBON NATIVE PLANT DEMONSTRATION GARDEN ENTERS PHASE II

In 2021, with support from BCF, the Richardson Bay Audubon Center began constructing a Native Plant Demonstration Garden to educate visitors about native plants and their importance for birds. Now in fall of 2022, with another BCF grant, volunteers are preparing the final two garden beds. Native plants grown from seeds collected on-site are growing quickly in the greenhouse and will be planted after the first major rainstorm.

A BCF grant is contributing to a Portuguese tile mural along the Old Rail Trail commemorating the four Portuguese dairy farms that used to exist on the Tiburon Peninsula. The mural will feature the dairy located on the Del Mar School site and will be comprised of traditional Portuguese tiles called "azulejos". The site will also include cork seating and traditional cobblestones also known as "calçadas."
